CORKSCREW SWAMP TOUR HIGHLIGHTS



On April 9, club members toured the Audubon Corkscrew Swamp Wildlife Sanctuary along its boardwalk. Sally Stein, the Director of Public Programs, led the tour and our very own Amy Swanson, a longtime volunteer at the sanctuary, also joined us. Many wildflowers were in bloom including a beautiful ionopsis orchid with dainty flowers. We also ventured into an area that is not generally accessible to the public to view a large specimen of the cigar or cow-horn orchid high in a tree. With regards to animals, there was a black-bellied whistling duck swimming between alligator flag plants, a baby red-shouldered hawk in its nest, a vulture nest in a tree cavity, and a juvenile little blue heron wading in the water. Other sightings are shown in the accompanying photographs. Eagle-eyed Amy spotted the Brazilian skipper butterfly caterpillar. She loves caterpillars! Thank you to Barb Van Esler for organizing the trip.



WATER CONSERVATION PRESENTATION

Don Rainey from the University of Florida/Institute of Agricultural Science spoke about "Applied Techniques in Water Conservation" at the Annual Meeting on April 16. He spoke about principles and practices that can be applied to our gardens and landscapes to conserve and efficiently use the limited water resources that we have available. These considerations are especially important because of the rapidly increasing population of Florida. Too many people want to live in this beautiful state that we call home! Although the irrigation practices in VillageWalk are largely out of our control, there are other ways that we can wisely use water. The Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Program from the University of Florida describes nine science-based principles for creating "healthy and beautiful landscapes that protect Florida's natural resources".



1. Right plant, right place
2. Water efficiently
3. Fertilize appropriately
4. Mulch
5. Attract wildlife
6. Manage yard pests responsibly
7. Recycle
8. Reduce storm water runoff
9. Protect the waterfront

The education of the public is impactful because kids and adults often put what they learn into practice in their own lives and in the lives of others.


